

In children, these may vary from person to person and age.

- Not meeting language and communication milestones
- Not meeting cognitive milestones
- Difficulty with concentration
- Difficulty Sequencing play
- Difficulty understanding spoken language (e.g. following directions or understanding what is said)
- Difficulty expressing spoken language (e.g. choosing the right words or speaking with words out of order)
- Difficulty with hearing
- Oral motor skills (e.g. not controlling food or liquid, not able to consistently say the sounds in words the same way every time)
- Feeding: difficulty swallowing or choking
- Decreased voice volume
- Difficulty with reading
- Needs an alternate communication device
- Displays frustration when not able to communicate clearly
- Unclear speech compared to same-age peers
